The Church Bulletin

Question: What may be the most produced church material yet often relegated to the recycling bin? Answer: The church bulletin. What exactly does the church's bulletin do? Why is it important and what does it do?

Personally, I don't recall Sunday services as a child with a bulletin (or even a children's page to color or to circle each *the*). Instead, there were hymnal boards on both sides of the Sanctuary with the day's two or three



hymns for the service. Back in the day people usually attended their local church, as they had since birth or the church they began attending once they had moved to the area. Of course, today we have our bulletin online which saves paper and gives our Snowbirds a way to follow us.

Back then it was an expensive undertaking to produce a weekly bulletin. For special services (Christmas, Easter), bulletins with preprinted covers were often purchased. The service information was then either mimeographed or copies made on the inside pages. Today's technology allows us to produce our bulletins on our computer screens, adding graphics where wanted, and then sending them to a laser printer for full-color printing. Bulletins are something we have come to expect.

They provide the service order, other items. We don't think much about dropping them in a recycle bin on our way out of the service.

Today's bulletin is more than just a simple order of worship. It is what we might call our "calling card". It reminds us of the many different things the church is

involved with, and it serves to introduce visitors to us as well. What does our Sunday bulletin say about us? How does it differentiate us from others? What does it tell others? My father-in-law used to collect church bulletins when the family was visiting other relatives or on vacation. Looking at them he could see what was emphasized by the pastor and congregation, what things a particular church was engaged in at that time (e.g., youth and community events, discipleship, outreach), and provided ideas for advancing his church (he was a

Presbyterian Ruling Elder). Perhaps we might do the same as we travel this summer and bring back to Trinity some ideas of what others are "saying" in their church's "calling cards".


As many of us may travel to other parts of the country this summer, perhaps even other parts of the world, remember that as the Psalm above declares, God will be right there with us!



Bible Reference



Pentecost Sunday

According to the United Methodist Church, Christians used a wide variety of symbols to express their faith. At times, these symbols provided believers with a sort of secret symbol that only initiates would understand. When a Christian met a stranger, he or she could draw one-half of the *ichthys* or "Jesus fish" and wait to see if the other could complete the drawing. There were a number of different Christian symbols, including the Chi-Rho, Alpha and Omega, anchor, fish, cross, dove, six-point star, and pelican.



Pentecost is the birthday of the church. The flame represents the Holy Spirit and images often include a dove or cross imbedded in the flame fingers. The birthday story begins with the Apostles and other followers of Jesus who gathered to celebrate the feast of the summer harvest. At the celebration a great wind was heard and what looked like flames appeared over the disciples and each disciple began speaking in tongues—languages that greatly differed. Miraculously, each of the followers heard the apostles speak in their own native language. Peter realized that this was the work of the Holy Spirit, lighting a fire in the disciples and changed their fear to the courage to begin sharing the story of Jesus throughout the world.

How do we share the Love of Christ with others outside of our church walls? Consider: *Blessings in a Bag, House of Hope, Hands and Feet, Heifer Project*, and of course our own *Choir* and *Praise Team*.



As Jesus would be, we are, as in the way of feeding the hungry and clothing those in need.

Trinity engages with our world and puts faith and love into action. Imagine—as you donate a bag of bags to *Blessings in a Bag*, someone stacks them flat, so they are more easily accessible to the people packing the food. Someone is keeping track of inventory and keeping foods stocked—so the actual deliveries can take place. A busy, engaged, and serving ministry.

Not only do the children and their families feel the love, but so do the school staff that distributes the weekend supply of meals. Every week during the school year, this happens.

House of Hope. You place your donation in the cart. We then weigh it, unload itfrom the collection cart into someone's car, and deliver to House of Hope. Of course, someone at home is collecting, carting to the church, and unloading their car.... Loving others as themselves.

Noisy Change. Your change going to the Heifer Project must be counted, accounted for, and distributed.

Hands and Feet. You collect and drop off items, we collect and store—until someone drives here to pick up—and deliver the load to that destination. These items are stored and used for children being picked up in an emergency situation and brought to a care destination with only the clothes (or PJ's, or a just diaper) on their back. If not you, then SOMEONE is making sure these things get done!

Not to mention our Pancake Breakfasts, Holiday Musical Dramas, Easter Sunrise Service, Concerts, Art Shows, our open dawn-to-dusk Fitness Trail, Hooks and Needles ladies donating baby hats and prayer shawls to people in need, and more, are involved in sharing love with others.

None of these offerings to our community happen magically. Our dedicated, engaged congregation—and people choosing to serve in leadership roles—make everything happen. *Do we share God's love in these settings? Do those we are serving to walk away feeling better? Is Trinity making the mark?*

We have an open table—everyone is truly welcome to partake in our Communion, enjoy our Sermons, participate in groups and classes, and take on a leadership role if so moved. This inclusive attitude is exactly what Jesus would want to see from His people. As we emulate Jesus, and become ambassadors of His Teachings, others will no doubt feel called to rise to the challenge as well. As they go forth spreading the Good News, we at Trinity have fulfilled our mission—Creating disciples for the Transformation of the World. Can grace, mercy, and love change the world? Can we do MORE?






OVERVIEW

Music Notes

Pulling Out The Stops

What a blessing it is for us at Trinity to have an organ at our church! There are not many churches able to claim that. The organ is one of the instruments used today in Traditional and, in some cases, also in Contemporary services and is one of the earliest instruments going back to 200 BC. Built in Greece originally, it was, and still is, a very intricate mechanism containing keyboards (called manuals); foot pedals (to be played like a third and fourth hand); windpipes with air




blowing through to sustain notes; stops (button-like objects which stop the air from blowing through the wrong pipes). In early days, organists had to pump with their feet to get the air flowing! No need to go to a gym! Click here to read more: https://www.miss-music.com/pipeorgans.html.

We are blessed to have a most talented organist at our church who ministers weekly at the 11:00 a.m. service. Her name is MJ Montague. Here's her story:

I began my music career at an early age with piano lessons from my older sister. I continued in piano with a Master's in Music Education from the University of Michigan. I then began teaching K-12 public school music. Since my father was a minister, and most churches assume that anyone who plays piano also plays the organ, I had already begun playing in churches. One of my most exciting times was at a Christian school in Jamaica, where I was the church organist and choir director, the K-12 music teacher, the community choir organist, and director of children's and junior choirs. I also gave class lessons in organ, piano, guitar, and accordion. After three years, I returned to the University of Michigan where I began my doctoral studies giving the doctoral recital in organ. Most recently, I've retired as Director of Music Education and University Organist at Brenau University in Gainesville, Georgia. Over the years, I've been both choir director and organist at several churches; but Trinity, working with Pastor Anil and Joyce, has been among the best!

God bless you, MJ. We are so happy you're here! Keep pulling out those stops!

creation of "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" to address public health issues. These clubs also taught local women how to properly care for their children.


After her mother passed away, Anna's mission was to honor her mother by continuing the work she started and to set aside a day to honor Mothers, "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world." Slowly over the next six years the United State of America began to acknowledge and celebrate the Day. Mother's Day was officially made a United States Public holiday in 1914.

In the beginning Mother's Day was about the maternal bonds between mother and child and the positive impact mothers had on society. In the early 1920s Anna Jarvis became so very embittered by the commercialization of Mother's Day that she protested and tried to rescind this celebration. We are so glad she did not succeed.



What is the Christian Year?

Ever wonder what or how the United Methodist Church celebrates the year? As seen in the figure to the right, the year is separated into various parts. Basically, the Church's year is separated into two periods of time, one dealing with Christmas (Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany) and Easter seasons (Lent, Easter, and Pentecost, in which we are currently observing). The second period is called Ordinary Time and during it the Church observes Trinity Sunday, All Saints' Day, and Christ the King Sunday. Note, too, that each period has colors assigned to it. These colors are often associated with how the sanctuary is prepared for Sunday worship as well as what the pastor may add to his or her vestments.



United Methodist Ecclesiastical Year

In general, the United Methodist Church's calendar year follows a structure similar to other Christian denominations, with differences attuned to various Church pieties. Part and parcel to the Church year is what is called the "Common Lectionary" or the flow of a cycle of scriptural texts that guide the Pastor's planning during the year (https://www.umcdiscipleship.org/articles/2023-revised-common-lectionary-sundays-special-days-only). Understanding how the Church perceives its year and helps us better understand what we should expect during Sunday and special services.

The word *if* is interesting. It is one of the most important words in the Bible because it speaks directly to our responsibility to God. Most promises in the Bible have conditions and the word *if* speaks to those conditions. Our responses to God's commands affect our relationship with Him and determine our receiving from Him, Jesus used the word *if* all the time. Almost half of the 574 occurrences in the *New Testament* are in the four Gospels. Clearly the choice is ours on the way we see the word *if*. The following is a few ways Jesus used the word *if*.

"[B]ut *if* you truly obey my voice and do all that I say, then I say, then I will be an enemy to your enemies." Exodus 23:22.

"[If] also after these things you do not obey me, then I will punish you seven times more for your sins." Leviticus 26:16.

"[A]ll these blessings will come upon you and overtake you *if* you obey the Lord your God." Deuteronomy 28:2.

"[If] you consent and obey, you will eat the best of the land." Isaiah 1:19.

"[If] I regard wickedness in my heart, the Lord will not hear." Psalm 66:18.

"[M]y heavenly Father will also do the same to you, *if* each of you does not forgive his brother from your heart." Matthew 18:35.

"[T]hat *if* you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." Romans 10:9.
